- Objective: Training participants *how to develop the administration of justice, from an organizational and policy perspective*. The focus will be on the Dutch and EU situation.
- Period: June 15th – 26th, 2009

Introduction

Within the dynamical context of Europeanization, the new member States Bulgaria and Romania, the (potential) candidate EU member states, as well as their neighbouring countries, are facing new demands and challenges, amongst others in strengthening the Rule of Law.

One of the main components of the Rule of Law is a well functioning system for the administration of justice. Many legal courses are currently being offered on the implications of EU legislation on, for example, the functioning of the judiciary.

The line of approach of this training however is different. The administration of justice will *not* be viewed from a legal viewpoint, *but from an organizational and policy perspective*. Because of the importance of an interdisciplinary approach, the content of the course focuses on the training needs of civil servants and those of judges and prosecutors.

The organizational and policy aspects of justice-administration are not strongly regulated by EU (as yet). Nevertheless, from the perspective of development, there are some strategic issues that all candidate EU member states, as well as their neighbouring countries, are dealing with. Whilst every country has its own particular challenges, there is a lot to be learnt from each other's experience in developing the administration of justice.

The MTEC programme is organised under the auspices of the Matra programme of the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs and is executed by the T.M.C. Asser Instituut on behalf of the EVD/CROSS Agency.

The objective of the Matra Training for European Cooperation (MTEC) training courses is to train public administrators and officials on matters relevant to joining the European Union.

A second important objective of the courses is the creation of long-lasting networks among participants whereby, on returning to their home countries, participants will have developed extended goodwill and friendship with fellow participants from other countries towards better cooperation, communication and information exchange.

Course Objectives

The general aim of this training programme is to share knowledge and to strengthen cooperation between public servants and magistrates in the European field of the administration of justice.

- The main objective of this programme is to equip the participants with the skill required *to develop the administration of justice from an organizational and policy perspective*. The focus will be on the Dutch and European situation.
- A second important objective of the training programme is the creation of long-lasting networks among participants whereby, on returning to their home countries, participants will have developed extended goodwill and friendship with fellow participants from other countries towards better cooperation, communication and information exchange.

On completion of the training, participants will:

- Have insight in actual European developments that influence the field of justice-administration
- Be able to discuss contemporary organizational challenges for candidate EU member states and neighbouring countries in developing the administration of justice
- Know how the Dutch administration of justice and judicial procedures are organized
- Know how Dutch public servants deal with strategic policy issues
- Be able to use the acquired knowledge and best practices as a source of inspiration for dealing with challenges related to the development of justice administration in their own countries
- Be trained in the practical application of specific subjects and in a number of oft-needed practical skills
- Have had the opportunity to share knowledge and experiences
- Have had the opportunity to create new professional cross-border networking relations.

Approach

The training programme will have a practical and interactive character. This is in line with the objective to share knowledge and strengthen the co-operation between the public servants and magistrates of the participating countries.

Structure and contents of the training programme

- Starting from a historic perspective, the Dutch system of justice administration and judicial procedures will be illustrated
- Various actors within the field of justice administration will be involved, e.g. judiciary, public prosecution service, bar association, process servers, legal aid boards
- From the perspective of development, the main focus will be on facing Europeanization and other new challenges. Where applicable, due attention will be paid to Dutch best practices
- Actual (strategic) policy issues will be discussed. For instance:
 - judicial chain management (for both criminal and civil chains)
 - court management
 - how to maintain balance between the quality of jurisdiction and the efficiency of procedures
 - the organization of small claims procedures

- how to make (or keep) legal aid accessible for citizens
 - treasure policy
 - the use of ICT for management information systems
 - lay justice and other forms of citizen involvement
 - jurisdiction in relation to the increasing demand for mediation and other forms of Alternative Dispute Resolution.
- Site visits will be paid to the Ministry of Justice, the Council for the Judiciary, District Courts and relevant European and international institutions to learn from best practices;
 - Participants will be invited to practically apply the information provided by comparing and working out a case or preparing a Back Home Action plan for their own country.

The contents of the programme will be fine-tuned on the basis of a pre-course questionnaire that will be sent to the intended participants in advance of their arrival in The Netherlands.

Course Organiser

The **T.M.C. Asser Instituut** is a professional, inter-university research institute for Private and Public International Law, International Commercial Arbitration and European Law. Through its affiliations with the Dutch universities (law faculties) and other Centres of Learning, the Asser Institute functions as an Academic Community Organiser for its many and diverse stakeholders. Programme Dates

The course will be held in The Hague from the 15th through the 26th of June, 2009. Participants will be expected to arrive in The Netherlands on Sunday, June 14th 2009. The date of departure will be on Saturday, the 27th of June.

Programme Costs

The Netherlands Government will provide full fellowships to selected participants. Each fellowship will cover the cost of international travel (economy), board and lodging, visa and insurance, tuition fees, lecture materials and excursions insofar as included in the programme.

Accommodation

Participants will be accommodated in single hotel rooms at the **NH Hotel The Hague**, located at Prinses Margrietplantsoen 100, The Hague. The hotel is conveniently located, close to the central train station and the city center.

Course Location

The course will be delivered from the same hotel where participants will be accommodated. The hotel's conference rooms are equipped with all modern facilities required for contemporary meetings/seminars, including interruption microphones to facilitate interaction and discussion.

Facilities

Participants will also be welcomed at the **T.M.C. Asser Instituut** itself (at R.J. Schimmelpenninklaan 20-22, The Hague). Open to the public is the Instituut's modern and well-equipped library, which is also an official European Documentation Centre (EDC). Computers with internet connection and printing facilities are available here for participants.

The Instituut is ideally positioned among the many European and international legal organisations in The Hague, offering participants endless inspiration and opportunity, as well as providing ready access to primary and secondary information. The Peace Palace and its famous library is only a 10-minute walk away, while the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia is at a mere 5 minutes walking distance.

Teaching Staff

The teaching staff consists of:

- Officials from the Ministry of Justice of the Netherlands and other Dutch policy departments;
- Professionals and researchers active in the subject area covered by the course.

Course Participants

Government officials and magistrates working in the field of the administration of justice are invited to apply. Application is open for applicants from Bulgaria, Romania, Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Kosovo, Turkey, Serbia, Montenegro, Macedonia, Russia, Belarus, Ukraine, Morocco and Moldova. A balance between the number of participants from the different countries will be taken into account during the selection procedure.

The maximum number of participants is 50.

Admission Requirements

Important points on which the selection of participants will largely be based are:

- The participant should be fluent in spoken and written English;
- The participant should be highly motivated and enthusiastic;
- The participant should be comfortable sharing their knowledge, possibly in the form of a solo presentation;
- The participant should clearly demonstrate an immediate need for training in the field of the development of the judiciary.

Applications

Applications should be made through the Netherlands Embassy in the applicant's country. Application forms should be downloaded from the website: www.cross-agency.nl

Go to Downloads, click on application form for the relevant course, click on your country; you can then download the application form.

Applications (duly signed by the applicant and his or her employer) should be submitted **before April 30, 2009** through the Royal Dutch Embassy in the applicants' country. By this date, all forms, including the signed employer statement, must be received by the Royal Netherlands Embassy. Please note that the application instructions on the website need to be followed carefully.

Only fully documented applications will be considered. Admission will be on a competitive basis. The participants will be selected by the steering committee.

Applicants who have been accepted for the course are expected to attend. In case of no-shows or cancellations within 3 weeks before the start of the course, the organisers reserve the right to claim any costs incurred from the applicant's employer.
